Pupil Pledge

Expectations and what pupils should know when speaking:

Sentences - know that you should answer in full sentences.

Hand away from mouth – know that you must keep your hand away from your mouth when speaking.

Articulate – know that you must try to pronounce words clearly.

Voice – know that you must speak with a voice which is loud enough for everyone in class to hear.

Focus – know that it is polite to focus on the person that is speaking to you or the person you are speaking to.

Body Language – Know that you need to use your body language in a positive way.

Expectations and what pupils should know when using good manners:

Thank you - know that pupils should say thank you when they receive something or someone does something for them.

Excuse Me – know that you should say excuse me when someone in your way.

Please – know that they should always say 'please' when they ask for something.

Smile – know that you should be positive and upbeat when talking to other people.

Expectations and what pupils should know when using good table manners:

Know that you should use your knife and fork correctly when eating your school dinner. Know that you should finish what you are eating before leaving your seat.

Know that you should be polite to the dinner staff and kitchen staff who cook for you. Know that you should help to ensure the space you use is left clean and tidy.

When will these routines to be taught:

- The expectations that all staff want to see in school will be taught at the beginning of the school year with reminder sessions each term.
- Staff will communicate these expectations with the children daily to ensure these expectations are embedded
- Staff will create opportunities so that all pupils from EYFS to Year 6 practice routines in school
